Directions: Choose 5 activities from the choice board below. Complete those activities in the space provided underneath the choice board. Each activity should be completed in a minimum of 3 complete sentences. Your answers should give enough information to show us your understanding of the novel.

<p>Character Choose one word (an adjective) to describe a character. Explain why you chose that word to describe the character.</p>	<p>Point of View Rewrite an event or a conversation from a chapter in the story from the point of view of a character we do not hear from.</p>	<p>Helpful Relationships Describe a relationship in the story that helps another character. Be sure to identify the characters in the relationship and explain how the relationship helps.</p>	<p>Similes and Metaphors Find a simile or a metaphor in the story (when two unlike things are compared). Write the simile or metaphor, and explain what it means and its significance in the story. Be sure to identify it as a simile or metaphor.</p>
<p>Setting Choose a setting in the story to describe. What are some norms (traditions, or things that are considered acceptable), rules, and laws in this setting?</p>	<p>Challenging Words Find a word that you do not recognize. Using context clues, write what you think that word means and what clues led you to that definition. Then, find the actual definition and write that down.</p>	<p>Hurtful Relationships Describe a relationship in the story that hurts another character. Be sure to identify the characters in the relationship and explain how the relationship hurts.</p>	<p>Mood Pick a few pages in the story. Identify those pages in your response and explain how these pages made you feel. Choose a quote from these pages that helped create that feeling for you. Include the quote in your response and explain why it made you feel that.</p>
<p>Conflict Describe a conflict in the story. How does the setting create that conflict? Which characters are affected and why?</p>	<p>Important Events Identify an important event from any chapter. Summarize that event, then describe how the story would be different if that event did not happen. Be sure to explain why.</p>	<p>Changing Relationships Describe a relationship in the story that changes. Be sure to identify the characters in the relationship and explain how the relationship changes.</p>	<p>Theme Describe a lesson you learned based off of the events and/or characters of the story. Explain how the story helped you learn that lesson.</p>
